## Annual Budget 2023/24

### Major Income & Expenses



5% increase to offset 4.5% Local Government Cost Index plus new project, policy and operational cost increases.

WA Local Govt Grants Commission - \$2.2m (received 30th June 2023). Roads and Transport Infrastructure Capital Grants -\$8.2M. Fees & Charges - \$2.68m.

Infrastructure Renewal - \$706k. Economic Development - \$1.47M. Community Centre Reserve - \$415k. Building Renewal Reserve - \$373k.

\$320,976 maintaining buildings across the Shire. \$2.37m for building renewal.

\$1.67 million to be spent maintaining sporting fields, parks, gardens, and campgrounds.

\$2.45 million to be spent maintaining roads, footpaths & other transport infrastructure .



#### Coastal area planning and management

The most significant feedback topic within this year's survey was the ongoing deoxygenation and fish kills at the Jurien Bay Marina. It remains Council's primary advocacy focus and we continue to engage with the State Government from multiple angles to seek improvement or resolution of the issue. Coastal inundation is also a concern for community members and we will be releasing shortly our adaption plan for community input which has been development over the past year.



#### Building and maintaining roads

The Shire continues to upgrade main commodity routes within its road network in partnership with both Federal and State Governments through the delivery of the Wheatbelt Secondary Freight Network and Regional Road Group Wheatbelt North Sub-Group projects respectively. This year our sealed road reconstruction and upgrade programs total \$7.3m which amounts to approximately 60kms of renewed and resealed roads. Shire officers continue to apply for additional road funding and have been successful in securing road funding for 2023-2024 to commence new works on Jurien East Road, Agaton Road and Gillingarra Road.



#### Economic development and job creation

Creating employment opportunities, developing aged care facilities and building new housing to attract and retain workers were key areas of community feedback. Although these aspirations lie in the realm of the private sector, the Shire actively advocates to Regional Development Australia, the Wheatbelt Development Commission and the State and Federal Governments and various departments for funding to support developers, investors and businesses to undertake these important economic development initiatives.



## **2022 Community Survey Priorities**

#### Seniors services, facilities and care

The Shire acknowledges that many members of the community would like to see an expansion in the Aged Care / Living opportunities. It remains a key advocacy focus for the Shire and a driver of our plan to continue to promote population growth in our region. Other common areas of feedback involved access to facilities and our footpath network which will continue to be a focus of our infrastructure department.



#### Sport and recreation facilities

The Shire acknowledges that our sporting and recreation facilities are a cornerstone of regional living. In 2022 we adopted our new Sport and Recreation Plan and are progressively working on improvement plans for precinct through deep each consultation with local sporting clubs. In addition, the Shire provides annual funding and facility maintenance to support our sporting clubs meet the needs of members. We will also continue to support local clubs with Club Development advice and resources.



#### Development and activation

Community feedback requesting improvements to the aesthetics and amenity of our CBD's was a common theme. In Jurien Bay the Shire has engaged Place Laboratory to prepare a Town Centre / Central Business District Masterplan to guide future improvements of the shopping areas and activation of this locality, similar to that of the recent works undertaken at the Jurien Bay Foreshore. The final draft of the Masterplan is due in early 2023 and will be distributed for public comment before Council considers adoption of this plan.



### Health and community services

Expanding the scope of our health services and upgrading the Jurien Bay Health Centre to a recognised 24/7 Hospital was a common theme in community feedback. The Shire continues to advocate at the regional level for more state provided services and we remain committed to the support of local GPs in the region through our contracts with the Jurien Bay Medical Centre which is currently serviced by 3 highly valued GPs.



### Responsible growth and development

Growing with respect to our local culture and history was a key theme in the community comments. The Shire tries to respond to this sentiment within our Local Planning Framework and Strategic Planning processes which guide our own project delivery and our Town Planning Scheme, which influences the private sector developments proposed for our region.



### Festivals, events, arts and cultural activities

Social engagement, capacity building, health and wellbeing and economic development are all areas that benefit from an active offering of community arts and cultural events across the Shire. Community feedback indicated an improvement in the types and number of events held over the past two years, the Shire continues to promote opportunities for community groups and event managers to host a range of events within the Shire via the Community Grants and Major Event Grant programs, both offered annually.
