GP Shortage Impacts

I am always interested Facebook comments on our doctor situation in Jurien Bay which is really the envy of most small communities in our area. Many regional towns have no doctors at all and yet we have been used to having three and are extremely lucky to have Dr Yuri and Dr Wee currently looking after our community.

I am fully aware that from time to time it is difficult to get an appointment in a short timeframe, however GP shortages exist across the world and our local duo already work long hours and try to see as many patients as they can. The dreadful NHS in the UK is testament to that fact and there are people unable to make phone appointments (due to the reception not being able to keep up with demand), turning up at the surgery and waiting to be spoken to.

Hospitals are dealing with patients presenting at emergency as they just cannot get an appointment to see a doctor.

The Shire of Dandaragan is in regular contact with the Jurien Bay Medical Centre to get our residents the very best care that we can and we hope an announcement on a new female doctor won't be far away.



Better Roads Pave the Way

In my role as Shire President, I am constantly looking at how others in different countries approach the same problems that we face at home. Probably one of the things that stand out for me is the condition of roads in the places that we visited. While they do not have gravel roads in most places, the condition of the road surfaces is dire in country towns within the UK.

Residents have taken matters into their own hands by planting trees in the potholes and in one particular town the image of a large phallus painted between two potholes made a very entertaining point.

Subsequently, this made it all over the press countrywide but did result in the job being fixed quickly. We are very proud of our roads and even though we have a large network, things are attended to in a timely fashion and our team are constantly across any problems that may arise.

Our Shire's Infrastructure team also work hard every year to secure both Federal and State funding to improve our sealed road network wherever they can.

Over the next couple of months we will be commencing Agaton Road after securing over \$4M from the Federal Government's Remote Roads Upgrade Pilot Program.

Addressing Housing Shortages

I was very happy to see the first project of its kind by the City of Fremantle in our suburb open last week. Eighteen newly built homes especially for older women experiencing homelessness in the local area were opened by Mayor Hannah Fitzhardinge.

They are a project by philanthropic developer My Home, which builds homes for people who are experiencing homelessness or are at risk of homelessness.

Fremantle are the first local government in WA to host the ground-breaking initiative which brings together government, non-government organisations, private sector, and community housing providers to deliver homes with personalised support services.

North Fremantle has a long history of involvement with social housing, and it makes diverse communities, better communities and a great place to live.

I am so happy to see this initiative and hope that we will see even more in the near future as housing is the most important matter before government at the moment that it needs to get on with. Older women, through no fault of their own, often find themselves homeless and requiring help. They are an important part of any community, and we are fortunate to have so many single ladies in our Shire who are involved in community groups.

We absolutely could not do without them and with new research showing people are living longer than ever these days, we ladies are still outliving men, but that is another conversation to be had.

All's Quiet on the Holiday Front

I have noticed that the towns are not so busy this school holidays and businesses are perhaps feeling the pinch with interest rates steadily climbing of late. This month's recent reprieve by the Reserve Bank is welcome I'm sure, but there is still uncertainty around whether rates will continue to climb or not in the near future.

This is a killer for small business who are providing non-essentials.

As my Coral Coast Tourism Board role informs me, this is the case all up and down the coast.

People who had not travelled abroad for 4 years due to the COVID-19 pandemic are now on the move. Planes are completely full on the new route from Rome, with families desperate to catch up with loved ones.



Bali is certainly back on the list now with Australians again and they are experiencing greater volume of visitors than ever. The problem now is that young Russian men, who are trying to escape being forced to join the army, are now in Bali in their thousands and behaving badly.

Local authorities are railing against them and making sure they now have correct visas and will expel them if they do not behave in a proper manner. I had heard that Australians will also have to have visas.

This affects local tourism for WA to a large extent as the cost of airfares and accommodation has remained very high in the coastal towns and people are largely voting with their feet.

Friends of ours who went to a popular coastal town after COVID and absolutely loved it have just discovered Bali and say they would not return to WA holidays as they had wonderful accommodation, food and service in a little island of Bali at half the price.

This is a real issue as we understand it is that wages play a huge part in the cost of local holidays, however, the bubble will burst unless hotels look at the future and not base prices on the past.

WATERFRONT DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS

We hope that the new Roberts Street Hotel/Resort will commence development soon to address the very enviable position we have in Jurien Bay with a lack of accommodation during busy times.

This project was ready to start before the global pandemic and then again soon after, but has currently stalled due to challenges around planning for long term coastal inundation.

We currently have an opportunity for a development at the Jurien Bay Marina which is very exciting for the town and the region overall, but this will also depend on the Marina being fixed before anyone will start building.

We are still pushing the State Government on this one but still without much luck at present. However, it may end up as an election promise at the next State election, one can only hope this is the case.

October LG Elections

Speaking of elections, Local Government elections are due in October and once again, I ask you to seriously consider a role as a councillor. It truly is the most rewarding and interesting role I have ever undertaken in my life and I am happy to chat to anyone interested about what the role is about.

I also encourage anyone interested to attend a Council meeting to see what takes place.

CBD DESIGN PLAN AVAILABLE FOR PUBLIC COMMENT

In 2021 the Shire advertised a Draft Urban Design Plan for the continual redevelopment of the public realm within the Jurien Bay CBD.

A number of submissions were received on the Draft Plan at this time, and these have informed the revision of the Plan as now represented for comment.

The revision of Plan has also been heavily influenced by the development approvals issued in 2022 for the redevelopment of the Jurien Bay Tourist Park and for a four-storey motel on the corner of Roberts and Sandpiper Streets, respectively.

Both these approved developments result in significant changes to the road verges of Roberts and Sandpiper Streets as shown in the revised plan.



Other notable changes from the Draft Plan include:

- The removable of any indicative physical building alterations on private land which is not under the care and control of the Shire;
- Identified parking layout changes throughout the CBD, including summary of current and future parking bay numbers;
- Inclusion of the previously designed realignment of Bashford Street as a local main street for if and when an Indian Ocean Drive bypass is constructed;
- Preservation of Roberts Street as vehicle thoroughfare, with the long-term access to be one-way between Bashford Street and Sandpiper Street in the direction of the foreshore; and
- Inclusion of an indicative public amenities within Pioneer Park.
- An electronic copy of the revised Plan is available for download on the Shire's website, or a hardcopy version is available from the Jurien Bay Administration Centre.

Comments on the revised Plan are invited until close of business Friday 4th August 2023.





From the AusIndustry Insights - Business Impacts weekly report - 14 July 2023

Multiple businesses report struggling with falling consumer demand, higher costs, and potential impacts of offshore renewable developments:

- The WA cray fishing industry reports concerns that the operation of offshore wind farms, which involve thrusting of pylons for wind turbine towers, will cause seismic waves that will stun crayfish in the surrounding areas and cause them to die.
- Local cray fishers also fear that these fishing areas will be considered no-go zones once the wind farms are operational.
