A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

My last report

One of my fondest memories is the beautiful hall decked out with lovely wildflowers for the Citizen of the Year presentation. Living in Cervantes for 20 years has been the highlight of our lives.

We went to buy a rundown old caravan park and worked 24/7 for a long time until we had enough money to hire enough staff so we could have an assistant to share the load which made life a bit easier.

Living on site was a challenge as you were available all the time and often woken up in the night with all sorts of weird things occurring.

It was convenient that I am a lover of snakes as I often got called out of bed to remove them; one I recall, from the bathrooms where it had decided to camp for the night in the cool of the tiles.

Our young Irish customers liked to party all night to the ire of anyone camping near them and we would get a knock on the door to come and quieten them down. One night a group of kids had migrated to a large tree and happily sat up in the branches with a few beers and their music.

When I asked if they would like to come down they invited me to join them and continue the party. I won't print my reply.

Cervantes, 20 years ago, was full of deckies who also loved a party and whose behaviour was also not conducive to a guiet stay at the caravan park. There was a path through the park that was a thoroughfare to the other side of the town from the pub. Regularly tents would be kicked and often urinated on which as you can imagine caused all sorts of complaints from the visitors. Thank goodness there was no emphasis on social media then that there is today, or we would never have had any customers.

We closed the gate so that they would have to go around which annoyed the school children who also used it as a quick way to school.

The other problem that we endured in those days was the Esky Run where young locals would come through in the dead of night and raid the eskies of the guests especially at busy holiday times. The worst times were Christmas when sophisticated groups would come around the caravan parks with trailers etc and steal kids bikes that were christmas gifts to sell in Perth.

Dale Simmons solved all our problems with the young locals by making sure that they behaved well if they wanted to play footy for the Tiger Sharks. We then enjoyed a quiet immunity which lasted for many years. Those were the days.

Another highlight of my time in Cervantes is watching the rise of a world class business in the Lobster Shack. David Thompson had a dream and he was able to fulfil it by sheer guts and determination. This business is now the 'go to' place for every international visitor that comes to WA. Sadly, David passed away over 12 months ago after a long fight with cancer, but his legacy keeps on growing thanks to his sons and daughters in law who will now strive to take the business to another level.

The work that I have been part of in Jurien Bay has given me so much satisfaction, especially as it has been so well received by both the residents and the travelling public. The COVID pandemic slowed us down a bit but my very able CEO, Brent Bailey, encouraged us to 'think big' and to concentrate on what we could do with our amazing foreshore. We certainly listened to him and as you know it has been a great success. I have to thank my Councillors for their enormous trust in our staff with the team working so hard for the great foreshore we have today.

The team at the Shire of Dandaragan were so invested in this project that everyone, regardless of their jobs, helped with the final planting of the gardens so that we could get it open. Jurien Bay has become the second fastest growing coastal town in WA. Only Busselton is growing at a faster rate.

We have all the problems found in every other town of which lack of housing is probably the biggest problem but hopefully my successors, together with the State Government, will find some good solutions.

As I have said before, I will now be living full time in North Fremantle but will always have a strong connection to Shire and its citizens.

The staff at the Shire are among the best we have ever had and I know that they will work hard to create a great environment for you all.

I wish you all prosperity, good health, and hope that your new Council will serve you well.

CERVANTES & JURIEN BAY COASTAL ADAPTATION INVESTIGATION

For the past two years, Water Technology on behalf of the Shire has been undertaking a detailed coastal adaptation investigation to identify the coastal management options for the central townsite coastal management units in Cervantes and Jurien Bay.

The draft investigation is now available for public review and submissions are invited until the close of business Friday 13th of October 2023.



Public information sessions on this investigation will be held on Wednesday the 27th of September 2023 as follows:

Jurien Bay - 12pm at the Jurien Bay Education and Conference Centre

Cervantes - 5:30pm at the Pinnacles Motel Function Room

The two primary coastal management actions recommended by the investigation for mitigating coastal erosion hazards in the study areas are:

- Planned / Managed Retreat: Use land-use planning instruments and long-term strategy to systematically move assets with low adaptive capacity out of the hazard zone. This is recommended for all of Jurien Bay central foreshore and the southern end of Cervantes central foreshore. As no built assets are projected to be unacceptably vulnerable until 2070, initial recommendations focus on coastal monitoring and appropriate land-use planning to allow for implementation of voluntary acquisition if required in future decades.
- Protection by Beach Groynes: Undertake the construction of groynes with beach renourishment as necessary to prevent erosion of natural and built assets. This is recommended for the northern end of Cervantes central foreshore.

VOTING IN THE OCTOBER 2023 LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTIONS

The State Government is putting into action the most significant reforms to the local government sector in 25 years. The reforms will increase the transparency, accountability and efficiency of local government in WA.

One of the key reforms is the change from 'first past the post' system of voting to optional preferential voting (OPV).

This change will be introduced for the October 2023 local government elections which will now be in line with state and federal elections.

OPV will strengthen democracy by giving ratepayers a greater choice of candidates.
