Cervantes Country Club

On Monday, 17 July, Council met to discuss the future of the Cervantes Country Club. This is a subject close to my heart as I lived in the little town for 20 years.

The Cervantes Club was built by locals many years ago when the lobster industry was flourishing, the town was full of people, and very vibrant. PORTABLE ADVERTISING SIGNAGE

Are you a business that currently uses portable advertising signage? If so, are you aware of the Shire's amended Advertising Devices (Signage) Local Planning Policy which was adopted by Council on 22 June 2023?

This new Policy outlines the following requirements for this type of signage:

- •Not exceed one sign per tenancy.
- •Only be displayed during normal operating hours of the business to which they relate and be removed thereafter.
- •Not exceed dimensions of 1.2m in height or width, with an area of not more than 1m².
- •Be located on private property or the immediately adjacent verge area.
- •Be secured and stabilised.

•Not be placed so as to obstruct pedestrian walkways, car parking bays, motorists or pedestrians.

•Not be placed on Shire infrastructure and vegetation, including public turfed areas.


A three-month moratorium from the amended Policy adoption date is currently in place before regulatory compliance on non-complying signage is commenced throughout the Shire.

This means only non-complying signage continuing to be displayed after 30 September 2023, will be impounded by the Shire Rangers at a fee of \$50 per sign.

As a result of this mandate, the Shire of Dandaragan is investigating the introduction of a public advertising scheme by which business can pay for the right to advertise in defined locations. LOCAL GOVERNMENT ALERT

Local government elections are scheduled for Saturday 21, October 2023.

The significant reforms of the Local Government Act 1995 include important changes to how people will vote.

This year, voting will be under the Optional Preferential Voting system, and for many large councils there will be direct elections of Mayors or Presidents for this election cycle.

FIRE SEASON IS JUST AROUND THE CORNER

With fire season not that far away, it is time to put your thinking caps on and find out how you're going to protect your home, family, and livelihood from the threat of bushfire through the coming months.

Now is a good time to get ahead of the rush and book your fire break contractors ready for 1 November. Some contractors have a wait time of six weeks to get through their list of clients' fire breaks so it's best you make the call soon. It is also a great time to clean the gutters, knock down the weeds surrounding your house and sheds, and create a bushfire plan; that's right, we will be nagging about this one for a while!

During times of intense stress and panic, our ability to think on the fly goes out the window. It is important that you make a plan, so you are prepared when a bush fire is heading in your direction.

Let's have a think about the following questions:

- Do you live in a rural area within eyeshot of bushland, or have vegetation on or near your property?
- Do you have belongings, photos and documents that are sentimental to you?
- Do you have dependents, pets, or livestock?
- Are you unsure of whether you will stay and defend, or evacuate and find refuge?

If you answered yes to any of these questions, it is important that you have a bush fire plan in place before summer.

Check out www.mybushfireplan.wa.gov.au on your PC or download the app via the App Store on your phone or tablet. This helpful guide, tailored to your family's needs, will help you reduce the stress and panic when a fire is coming towards you.

It is best if you sit down with your household, have a chat and make the plan together. It is important that everyone understands the plan, knows their role, and provides input to ensure everything that is important to you and them remains safe this fire season.

Scribblers Festival Explore the World of Creative Bravery

Scribblers Festival celebrates creativity, literacy, and the special place local libraries hold in the hearts of children and parents. Each year over 15,000 feather shaped bookmarks are hidden in the children's and young adult section of libraries across Western Australia with five rare Golden Feathers waiting to be found by lucky young readers as part of the annual Golden Feather Hunt.

Feather finders have the opportunity to win a variety of prizes, but most of all, fuel their love of reading and libraries.

The Scribblers Festival is an annual festival of literature and arts for young people. It invites young people and the young at heart to celebrate the magic of storytelling and brings together authors, illustrators, and other storytellers from Perth, across Australia, and around the world to empower and engage young readers through interactive sessions and workshops.
